MONTHLY SPOTLIGHT

Draft Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan Update

The draft Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan was released for public review in late September. The plan was presented for public viewing and discussion at an open house in September and an online survey was also available for comment until mid-October. Since then, city staff has fielded questions and discussed the plan with local organizations including the Greater Eugene Area Riders (GEARs) at a general meeting. Public comments are currently being compiled for presentation to City Council on Monday, November 14. The presentation will take place during the Council work session that starts at 5:30 PM.



The Eugene Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan includes a list of proposed capital projects and policies aimed at increasing the safety and comfort of cyclists and pedestrians throughout the city. In addition, the Plan identifies intersections prone to user conflicts and recommends feasibility studies for areas where additional analysis is necessary.

The Plan seeks to elevate the level of bicycle and pedestrian accommodation throughout Eugene to enhance connectivity, improve safety, and increase the appeal of these active transportation modes for regular travel and for recreational pursuits. To do this, the Plan recommends innovative solutions including buffered bicycle lanes, shared lane markings, colored pavement, and green bike boxes (see image). While some of these facilities already existed as part of Eugene's transportation network the plan provides a blueprint for where additional installations of these facilities should occur.

Lane Council of Governments to Debut "Cycle Lane" mobile phone application for iPhone and Android to improve Eugene-Springfield bicycle riding

This week planners at Lane Council of Governments, debuted "CycleLane" a free application for iPhone and Android that allows residents of the Eugene-Springfield to help planners better understand bicycle behavior. Users in the area can download and use the application, which sends information about their preferred bicycle route and to LCOG data bases for analysis and planning.



The app consists of a GPS interface which tracks a person's ride from origin to destination. After downloading the application, it will ask for a few pieces of information pertaining to the user like frequency riding

and age, which are all optional and confidential. Once the ride is completed the user is asked to submit the trip's purpose and then the trip information is saved on the phone and simultaneously submitted to LCOG.

"The key to success will be getting local residents informed about this app and how much it will help local planners", said Josh Roll a planner leading the effort. With more trips, riders can help inform LCOG which routes are popular for riding and at what time of day, informing the region's bicycle planning process. Additional demographic information requested upon downloading the application will also inform policymakers of how to best plan for a diverse riding population.

The application may be downloaded for iPhone or Android from their respective markets and more information about the app itself can be found at the Cycle Lane website: <http://cyclelane.lcog.org>. As an incentive, users who choose to enter their email address will have an opportunity to win a free gift certificate to a local bicycle shop. Josh Roll, stated that identical technology was employed in San Francisco with great success, and they were able to gather 20,000 unique trips, a treasure trove of data that will greatly inform their bicycle planning processes.

See...and be seen - ODOT offers reflective arm bands to improve pedestrian visibility

Dark colored clothing and coats may look chic, but at night or on cloudy days, they can make pedestrians almost invisible. Every year in Oregon, the majority of pedestrian fatalities occur at night or in low-light hours. In 2010, 74 percent of the fatal pedestrian crashes occurred during low-light conditions.



Improving visibility means improving safety. That's why the Oregon Department of Transportation is urging pedestrians to "see and be seen" this fall. Wearing light colors or reflective clothing is one of the simplest things pedestrians can do to keep themselves safe, and to help out, ODOT's Transportation Safety Division is giving away reflective safety sashes and arm bands that people can wear over their clothes.

The bright yellow sashes and bands are being distributed in limited numbers to safety groups in communities statewide as part of a campaign to improve pedestrian visibility and safety. Request a reflective arm band or sash from Eugene Public Works (541-682-5291).

Motorists and pedestrians are also encouraged to follow these safety tips:

Pedestrians

- Wear bright or reflective clothing or shoes when walking at night. Avoid dark clothes; drivers can't avoid what they can't see.
- Don't wear headphones or talk on a cell phone while crossing the street.
- Watch out for motorists' blind spots.
- Remain alert! Don't assume that cars are going to stop.
- Be aware of vehicles around you. Make eye contact with motorists before crossing paths.

Motorists

- Watch for pedestrians especially at night.
- Expect and slow for pedestrians in popular walking areas and near crosswalks.
- Drive at cautious speeds in rainy weather and in low-light areas.
- Don't talk or text while driving. Distracted driving kills.

- Remain Alert!

Oregon Parks and Recreation Department to hold public hearings – November 9 & 14

The Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) is conducting two public hearings on proposed routes for scenic bikeways in towns along each route.

The two proposed bikeways are Twin Bridges, a 36 mile loop passing through Bend and Tumalo, and Covered Bridges, a 36 mile route passing through Cottage Grove. Management plans and information on the designation process for the proposed scenic bikeways are available at www.oregonscenicbikeways.org

The first hearing, for the proposed Covered Bridges Bikeway, is Wednesday November 9 from 5:30 - 6:30 pm at the Cottage Grove community center in the Shepherd room. 700 East Gibbs Avenue, Cottage Grove.

The second hearing, for the proposed Twin Bridges Bikeway, is Monday November 14 from 5:30 - 6:30 pm in the Visit Bend office. 750 NW Lava Rd suite 160, Bend.

How to Report Maintenance Issues for City Facilities

Glass on the path, leaves in the bike lane, or bushes overhanging the sidewalk? Report it to the City of Eugene!

Here are three options for reporting maintenance issues in bike lanes, on multi-use paths, sidewalks. You can use the first two to report any other issues in city right of way or parks:

1. Call 541-682-4800 during business hours.
2. Send an email to: pwmaintenance@ci.eugene.or.us
3. Go to the City website – www.eugene-or.gov , then go to the dropdown menu on the left side and choose Public Works Maintenance, then click on “Bike Lane Service.”

Report a Pothole Program

It's easy to report a pothole to the Eugene Public Works Maintenance Division! There is even a handy online pothole reporting form available at [www.eugene-or.gov/pothole!](http://www.eugene-or.gov/pothole) The form will ask for some brief information about the pothole, including its location (if on the path, try to give as much location info as possible). There's also a place for you to provide your contact information. If you would prefer, you can call Public Works Maintenance at 541-682-4800 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and file the report over the phone.

If you'd like to follow up with the City after making a pothole request, just send an email to pwmaintenance@ci.eugene.or.us with the word "pothole" in the subject line.

(Please remember that Eugene Public Works only repairs potholes on streets/paths in the city of Eugene. We will make a field inspection of every reported pothole within two business days. In many cases we will immediately fill the pothole; however, in some cases we may choose to wait to schedule an alternate treatment such as maintenance overlay. FMI: go to www.eugene-or.gov/pothole)
