Big “O” – An “O” (representing the UO) on the side of Skinner Butte is visible from the air and the city. This emblem was erected in the early 20th century.

Eugene Skinner Cabin Replica – Eugene’s founder built the original cabin in 1846 and lived there with his wife, Mary. The replica was built in 1972 and placed at the current location in Skinner Butte Park in 1996 as part of the commemoration of the Applegate Trail. Deady Hall – The first building on the University of Oregon campus. Construction was completed in 1876. It was the only building on campus until the building of Villard Hall in 1886. NW side of the University of Oregon campus.

Hendricks Park – Eugene’s oldest city park. Its 78 acres include a mature forest and a world-renowned Rhododendron garden. The Francis M. Wilkins Shelter, constructed in 1938, is named in honor of one of the park’s founders. Summit Avenue and Skyline Blvd.

Eugene Pioneer Cemetery – (also known as Pioneer Memorial Cemetery and Independent Order of Odd Fellows – I.O.O.F. Cemetery), is one of the three oldest cemeteries in Eugene. East 18th Avenue and University Street.

The Masonic Cemetery – The first official burial place in the city and is the resting place of the city’s founder, Eugene F. Skinner. The cemetery has carefully inventoried more than 100 species of native plants on site with information provided about many of them. 25th Avenue and University Street.

Hope Abbey Mausoleum – Built by the Portland Mausoleum Company in 1913, it has an Egyptian Revival motif that makes it unlike any other building in Oregon. Southwest entrance to the Eugene Pioneer Cemetery.
